

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


Re: National Grid Pole Petition #21437370 (Elm Street)

Jim:

I have reviewed DPW records and visited the site to view the proposed relocation of pole #18 on Elm Street just west of College Lane. The proposed relocation of pole #18 is part of a Smith College project. It is approximately 10 feet west and northerly of its current location and 47 feet west of the centerline line of College Lane. The alignment of the overhead wiring for three poles is shifting northerly as part of the project according to National Grid, and Smith College's proposed plan.

There are underground city utilities on the south side of Elm Street in the vicinity of the proposed new pole location, some of which (sewer and drain) are also proposed to be relocated as part of the project. It is my recommendation that the relocated pole be placed a minimum of 5 feet from the new sewer alignment. Other than this recommendation, I do not see any other issues for the DPW with this petition.

A Resolution

Recognizing the Second Monday of October as Indigenous Peoples Day

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton recognizes that the Indigenous Peoples of the lands that would later become known as the Americas have occupied these lands since time immemorial; and

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton recognizes that Northampton is built upon the ancestral homelands and villages of the Indigenous Peoples of this region without whom the building of the City would not have been possible, to wit, from the Mohegan Tribe the Nipmucs and the Pequots, and from the Mohican Tribe, the Pocumtucs who established the Village of Norwottuck – or Nonotuck -- upon which much of present-day Northampton is situated; and

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton wishes to uplift the indigenous roots and history of, and contributions to, our city and this country;

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton is committed to respecting and protecting the full range of human rights as set forth in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and numerous other international human rights treaties; and

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton, in an effort to promote truth, healing, reconciliation, redress, and justice, acknowledges the ongoing trauma and historical harms, acts of genocide, and violations of the human rights of Native American, Alaskan Native, and other American Indigenous Peoples; and

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton has a responsibility to oppose the systemic racism towards Indigenous People in the United States which perpetuates their income, health, educational, and social inequality; and

WHEREAS, despite the fact that the federal government guaranteed the health, safety, and welfare of tribal nations in exchange for over 450 million acres of tribal land, American Indian and Alaska Native citizens experience higher disease rates, lower life expectancy rates, higher dropout rates, and higher poverty rates than any other racial or ethnic group in the country¹; and

WHEREAS, the median income of American Indian and Alaska Native households is 70 percent of the median income of all U.S. households, and 28.4 percent of American Indians and Alaska Natives live in poverty compared to 15.3 Americans as a whole²; and

WHEREAS, American Indians and Alaska Natives have a life expectancy that is 4.2 years less than all other races in the United States and die at higher rates than other Americans from many diseases and harms including

chronic liver disease and cirrhosis, diabetes, assault and homicide, and intentional self-harm and suicide³; and

WHEREAS, data from the National Center for Education Statistics shows that on average, less than 50 percent of American Indian and Alaska Native students graduate from high school⁴; and

WHEREAS, the City of Northampton understands that in order to help close the equity gap, government entities, organizations, and other public institutions should change their policies and practices to better reflect and significantly improve the experiences and outcomes of American Indian people; and

WHEREAS, the idea of Indigenous Peoples Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native nations to the United Nations-sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas⁵; and

WHEREAS, in 1990, representatives from 120 Indigenous nations at the First Continental Conference on 500 Years of Indian Resistance unanimously passed a resolution to transform Columbus Day into an occasion to strengthen the process of continental unity and struggle towards liberation, and thereby use the occasion to reveal a more accurate historical record⁶; and

WHEREAS, the United States federal government, the State of Massachusetts, and the City of Northampton recognize Columbus Day on the second Monday of October, in accordance with the federal holiday established in 1937;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of Northampton, Massachusetts

1. Hereby proclaims that the second Monday in October each year will be known as Indigenous Peoples Day; and
2. Celebrates and honors the foundational contributions of Indigenous People to the history of our City, the State of Massachusetts, and our country; and
3. Encourages the City's schools and other institutions to use Indigenous Peoples Day as a point from which to, throughout the year, reflect upon and learn about the historical abuses and continuing struggles of indigenous nations, and to celebrate the magnificent foundations of the indigenous people of this land upon which our city, state, and country were built; and
4. Encourages businesses and organizations in Northampton to recognize Indigenous Peoples Day; and
5. Shall continue to promote racial, economic, educational, health, and social equity and justice for all people and oppose discrimination towards Indigenous Peoples as it is perpetuated through inequities in income, health, and education.

1 WHEREAS, The City of Northampton is guided by a fundamental and compelling
2 interest to protect the civil rights of all its citizens and visitors, support
3 public policies that prohibit unjust discrimination, and promote a society
4 characterized by freedom and equality; and

6 WHEREAS, A free and equal society is one in which all people may access public
7 places, including commercial space such as restaurants, hotels, and
8 theaters as well as public space such as municipal buildings, parks and
9 public transportation, among others, on equal terms; and

11 WHEREAS, In 2011 the Massachusetts legislature extended protections against
12 discrimination on the basis of gender identity in matters of housing,
13 employment, credit and education, but not in matters relative to public
14 accommodations such as those described above; and

16 WHEREAS, Today, legislation currently before the legislature would close this gap in
17 state law and extend such protections to all people to prohibit
18 discrimination in matters of public accommodations on the basis of gender
19 identity and guarantee equal access to public places regardless of gender

23 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Northampton,

26 1. Affirms that it is the policy of the City of Northampton that no person shall
27 unjustly discriminate against any person belonging to a protected category,

29 gender identity, genetic information, mental or physical ability, race, religion, sex,
30 sexual orientation, socioeconomic status or veteran status, relative to any essential
31 public matter involving goods, services, or access that are generally available to
32 all people, including education, employment, health care, housing, municipal
33 services and public accommodations.

35 2. Affirms that it is the policy of the City of Northampton that no one shall refuse to
36 grant admission to and full enjoyment of any public accommodation within the

Councilor O'Donnell moved to approve the resolution in first reading; Councilor Sciarra seconded the motion. The motion was approved on a roll call vote of 9 Yes, 0 No.

Councilor O'Donnell noted that in 2011 the City Council approved a resolution in support of the last expansion of civil rights protections at the state level for gender identity in matters of education, housing, employment and credit. However, at that time there was a carve out that did not extend protections for people on the basis of gender identity in matters of public accommodations. Public accommodation is anywhere you might go that is not in your house. Therefore, this would include restaurants, hotels, shopping malls, etc. About seventeen or so states have non-discrimination laws in place, however, Massachusetts is the only state with carve outs for no protections for people in matters of public accommodations. The purpose of the resolution is to affirm that we would like the state legislature to act and for the Governor to sign legislation to close the loophole in our state's civil rights law.

Councilor LaBarge thinks Northampton is known for its great diversity. She has not heard of any places where there were problems, so she had concerns regarding the language in the proposed resolution. Northampton doesn't allow hate crimes, and is very protective with anyone who lives or visits the City.

Councilor O'Donnell explained that our democracies and our freedoms are not just about our government, but about our whole society. People need to go about their lives without fear of harassment or discrimination. The City of Northampton has shown by example how that is possible. He looks upon this resolution as a way to lead by example and show the state that this is a good thing to do. With this resolution the City will reaffirm its policy on human rights, but the biggest use of this will be to assert the City's opinion regarding state legislation; what Northampton gets right, Councilor O'Donnell would like to see extended to the rest of the Commonwealth.

Councilor LaBarge noted that the Human Rights Commission was established to promote awareness about the importance of diversity; the Police Department is very good; neighbors watch neighbors and hate crimes, while an issue four years ago, do not seem to be a current problem. She understands that Councilor O'Donnell wants the Governor to include public places and so forth.

Councilor Dwight commented that the State Senate has advanced their Bill out of committee; Senator Stan Rosenberg has posted this information on his website. The Bill is now pending in the Legislature. This resolution reaffirms our commitment to see that there is fairness, justice and equity and not just give lip service.

Councilor Carney thanked Councilor O'Donnell for bringing the resolution forward. She notes that the timing coincides with the Pride Parade Day on Saturday, May 8, 2016. This will be the 35th annual event in Northampton. It will be a great day of recognition for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people across the City.

Councilor O'Donnell explained that this is an ordinance that would make it unlawful for future City Councils or Mayors to seek to privatize the City's water system. The reason for this is due primarily to what has happened in other communities across the country and across the state. In any given community there might be mounting maintenance needs to the water infrastructure that may make privatization look like an attractive alternative. Private companies may claim that they can do a better job at a lesser cost, however, there are numerous examples where this has not worked out the way it was planned. The Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management states that it is rare that a community will see cost savings associated with privatizing water infrastructure. What you do see is a misalignment of incentives. No longer is health and safety of the public the number one priority. Profit becomes the number one priority. Also, there is a lack of public accountability. Privatizing water infrastructure would mean eliminating democratic accountability and misaligning incentives which should be aligned such that the people of the City are served first. Examples of where this has gone wrong include the City of Atlanta which signed a 20-year lease with United Water. Atlanta terminated the agreement in the first four years due to poor service characterized by unresponsiveness, epidemic water main breaks, "boil your water" alerts, and brown water from taps. etc. Indianapolis had the same kind of experience. The City of Lynn, Massachusetts once had privatized water from a company called Veolia. The company eliminated the use of an important chemical that was used to treat the water and the result was an unbearable stench for a period of time. The City of Gloucester, Massachusetts had to pay a large fine to the State because city officials failed to recognize a bacterial problem and because of lax oversight by the City of its private contractor. The City of Plymouth, Mass. sued Veolia after the City experienced water main breaks that cost over \$2 million. The City believes that the breaks were the direct result of failure by the company to properly maintain the wastewater collection system. The person who is running the utility has every incentive to cut cost; Councilor O'Donnell feels that something as basic as water should remain owned by the public.

Councilor Klein thanked Councilor O'Donnell and the Mayor for introducing this ordinance that deals with a basic human right. She feels it is the responsibility of the City to insure that the water is safe and healthy, and that it is good for all of the residents, and that it will remain that way for future generations. Water is a public resource and as such it should be maintained by municipalities that have the public's health and well-being in mind. When private companies control resources, profit motives take precedence. Another example of a City that chose to privatize its water infrastructure is Hoboken, New Jersey. The company that was chosen, called, Suez, failed to provide the necessary upgrades to the City's infrastructure that within less than a week in March, there were two devastating water main breaks that caused large portions of the city to be without water for several days. The American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) is working hand-in-hand with private companies to privatize things like education and water; Councilor Klein noted that corporate lobbyists are attempting to create legislation that is looking to promote private industry over public management. Organizations like ALEC say that it is more cost effective to privatize systems, however, it has been proven through research that this is untrue. Councilor Klein notes that it is important to align the City's values with the needs of its citizens.

Councilor Bidwell supports the ordinance and believes it is a forward looking measure. He believes that Northampton should be one of those communities that make its water infrastructure unavailable for privatization.

Councilor Adams does not support the ordinance as he believes that this would preclude the City from certain opportunities. He believes that the proper safeguards are already in place. He agrees that everyone should have water and that they have a right to it. He was one of the people to vote to close the landfill to put the solar array above it. He wonders if this could be used to prevent that in the future. This is one of his concerns; when we do this we might be preventing good opportunities in the future. Jonathan Goldman who is a Northampton citizen and a former member of the Youth Commission wrote a letter to some of the councilors. Councilor Adams read several passages from Mr. Goldman's report. In it he states that he has put a great amount of research into this and concludes that not all private ownership models pose problems often associated with non-public ownership. Mr. Goldman reports that the most comprehensive study done by the Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management (2010) found that when comparing all successes and failures of private ownership, there is little to no harm from shifting ownership of water resources and sometimes there is significant benefit. Mr. Goldman feels that passing an ordinance that affects the ability of future City Councils to take an action in dire situations would be irresponsible. Mr. Goldman cited 2002 150-page assessment by the National Research Council on the privatization of water in the US which gives several examples of when creating a ban, like that proposed in the ordinance could be potentially harmful. He feels that while private ownership can sometimes be detrimental, leasing has proven to be effective across the country and has few of the other problems of private ownership. Councilor Adams finds the ordinance shortsighted and illegalizes future opportunities for the City. Since leases and sales require City Council approval, he believes that the proper safeguards are already in place. Councilor Adams points out that Solicitor Seewald has ruled in several instances that City Council cannot by ordinance require the Executive Branch to do anything or order it to not do anything. Sometimes that has been his position; an example of that would be two years ago when the Mayor issued his executive policy on immigration protection. Councilor Adams drafted an ordinance that was deemed illegal by Solicitor Seewald because the City Council cannot mandate a certain policy of the Executive Branch. Earlier this year Solicitor Seewald told the City Council that they did not have the authority to regulate parking spaces near a building controlled by the Executive Branch. This ordinance tells the DPW that it cannot sell, lease, or transfer the water infrastructure. Councilor Adams feels this is clearly the legislature putting a limitation on the Executive Branch. Councilor Adams believes that the Solicitor needs to figure out what the charter means, especially with respect to the separation of powers. His rulings have been inconsistent; he ignores his previous opinions when he finds it convenient and when he wants to give the Mayor whatever he wants. His interpretation of what is legal depends on who is asking the question.

Councilor O'Donnell thanked Councilor Adams for his comments. The report by the Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management is about the cost difference. The report says that there is no cost difference between public and private models. It also states that overall private ownership offers more incentives for cost reduction but these incentives can induce quality erosion. The other report that is cited, from National Research Council states that private operators being under contract are often farther removed from local politics which has the advantage of less political intervention in matters of technical management that can lead to less transparency and accountability. To the question whether this ordinance will "tie our hands", Councilor O'Donnell stated that if the City were ever in an emergency situation, there could always be a vote to modify or repeal the ordinance. There would be nothing preventing the Council from taking action in the case of an emergency. Regarding the question of leasing, Councilor O'Donnell states that nothing in the ordinance prevents the City from seeking outside (consultant) help on issues regarding its infrastructure. For example, the City could retain a private water meter reading service. This would not be equivalent to relinquishing control of the infrastructure. There is nothing to

prevent the City Council from setting broad policy about its water infrastructure.

Councilor LaBarge had concerns, especially with the mention of the landfill because the City is looking at putting solar in the landfill. Mayor Narkewicz stated that the City is leasing out the capped portion of the landfill, but that this is not part of the water or sewer system. Councilor LaBarge noted that the Barnes Aqua filter is located on this property. Mayor Narkewicz noted that this ordinance would not affect the landfill in any way.

Councilor Murphy made a motion to move the question; Councilor Adams seconded the motion. The motion was approved on a voice vote (and a show of hands) of 5 Yes, 4 No (Councilors Sciarra, O'Donnell, Dwight and Klein).

Councilor LaBarge requested an opinion from the City Solicitor relative to the legality of the ordinance as she is concerned about what she was hearing from Councilors Adams and O'Donnell. The opinion could be expressed in writing or the Solicitor could attend the next City Council meeting. Councilor Dwight agreed to follow up.

Councilor Adams asked that he compare this to other opinions that he has given; Councilor Dwight will ask for the Solicitor's opinion on this one issue; if Councilor Adams has concerns relative to other opinions he has given, he should pursue them himself.

Jim:

I have reviewed DPW records and visited the site to view the proposed relocation of pole #18 on Elm Street just west of College Lane. The proposed relocation of pole #18 is part of a Smith College project. It is approximately 10 feet west and northerly of its current location and 47 feet west of the centerline line of College Lane. The alignment of the overhead wiring for three poles is shifting northerly as part of the project according to National Grid, and Smith College's proposed plan.

There are underground city utilities on the south side of Elm Street in the vicinity of the proposed new pole location, some of which (sewer and drain) are also proposed to be relocated as part of the project. It is my recommendation that the relocated pole be placed a minimum of 5 feet from the new sewer alignment. Other than this recommendation, I do not see any other issues for the DPW with this petition.





Chairman Dwight and City Councilors,

In January, 2016 the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) began reviewing project proposals submitted for CPA funding. After extensive review including applicant presentations, public comment sessions and committee deliberation the CPC unanimously voted to recommend eight funding requests totaling \$1,455,285. Collectively, these projects will leverage just over one and a half million dollars from other funding sources, including state and federal grants, private contributions, and volunteer work.

Complete CPA applications that include detailed information about each project recommended are available at www.archive.northamptonma.gov:8080/WebLink8/0/fol/527862/Row1.aspx, and meeting minutes, information about the CPA, and other project materials can be accessed on the CPC's webpage: www.northamptonma.gov/1048/Community-Preservation-Committee.

Projects Recommended for Funding:

Stained Glass Window Restoration, First Churches of Northampton: \$213,000

These funds will be used to restore two of the historic stained glass windows in the church sanctuary: The Tiffany window, which was gifted to the Church by the Parsons family in 1899, and the Rose window, which faces Main Street.

Saw Mill Hills Open Space Acquisition, Northampton Conservation Commission: \$72,000

This acquisition will add 22 acres to the Saw Mill Hills in Leeds: 3 acres on the western side of Reservoir Road with direct water access, and 19 acres of bluff and views overlooking the reservoir.

Historic Scenic Curtain Restoration, Academy of Music: \$44,785

This project will allow the Academy to restore a scenic curtain depicting a Northampton scene that was recently found stapled to the back of the main stage curtain. It is thought to be the largest remaining historic curtain on the East Coast.

Supportive Housing for Homeless Youth, Friends of Hampshire County Homeless Individuals: \$275,000

CPA funds will be used to contribute to the purchase price of a house in Northampton that will provide up to eight units of housing and support service for unaccompanied homeless youth. Homeless individuals between 18 and 25 face a gap in housing services that this home will help to address.

Conservation Fund, Northampton Conservation Commission: \$30,000

This fund creates opportunities for protection of open space and agricultural parcels in Northampton by allowing for fast action on time-sensitive real estate opportunities. The Fund creates an at-hand resource to conduct necessary due diligence work prior to acquisitions.

Fitzgerald Lake Invasive Plant Control, Broad Brook Coalition \$12,800

These funds will allow BBC to continue efforts to control and eliminate several different species of invasive plants that are damaging critical habitats essential to the health of native wildlife and plants, including endangered species.

Shepherd Barn Dendrochronology Study, Historic Northampton: \$2,300

CPA funds will be used to conduct a dendrochronology wood-dating study of the Shepherd Barn at historic Northampton, which will be used in preparation for a full restoration project of the structure.

Pulaski Park Renovation and Expansion, Northampton Department of Public Works: \$805,400

CPA funds will be used to continue design and construction of Pulaski Park. This phase includes construction of the Overlook Expansion that will create new park space to the rear of the existing park. The Committee recommends bonding for a portion of this project..







Comments, Discussion & Debate:

City Council Vice-President Ryan O'Donnell was present to talk about the ordinance that he is proposing. The ordinance seeks to prevent privatizing the city's water supply. The ordinance is modeled after an ordinance that was enacted in Gloucester. That city took the ordinance one step further and added language into their charter to prevent privatizing of their water. The right built into their charter is a right of referendum; if the city looked to privatize their water infrastructure, then the measure would be voted upon by residents in the community. Last year, New Jersey Governor Chris Christie signed a bill into law that would allow for fast-tracking the privatization of public water systems in New Jersey. The "Water Infrastructure Protection Act" removes the public vote requirement to sell water systems throughout the state under emergency conditions.

Across the country there have been strained budgets and mounting financial pressures felt by municipalities. This has led to corporations taking over the infrastructure of a city's resources such as water. One place this happened was Atlanta Georgia. That municipality has since switched back because of problems associated with privatizing. One very good example of where privatizing failed is Flint Michigan. The results have been disastrous for that community. The poisoning of the water by lead is a direct result of emergency managers making a variety of decisions with very little public accountability and driven by the desire to save money without any concern for public health or well-being. Other examples of privatization of public services has been in the areas of education,

transportation and utilities. However, he believes people would like the ability to continue to debate water and sewer rates and would prefer that such infrastructure remain with the city.

Councilor Dwight asked whether this ordinance was a prevention measure; Councilor O'Donnell noted that the city has a good water infrastructure system that the city should be proud of and should try to protect. Such an ordinance is a proactive measure to provide such protection. While the current mayor or city council may not look to privatize the water system, the ordinance would look to provide protection into the future.

Councilor O'Donnell shared the experience of privatizing Atlanta Georgia's water system. The city faced the high cost of its water infrastructure and also was facing the high cost of deferred maintenance. The city entered into contract with United Water. The company was able to provide the service at a lesser cost than the city. Private companies don't have to carry the same costs that government does. After a period of time, problems arose regarding the quality of the city's water and people inevitably raised concern about it issue. Ultimately the contract between the city and the company ended after 4 years of a twenty year contract.

Councilor Bidwell supports the ordinance; he commented that the Committee on Community Resources reviewed the ordinance last week. He likes the idea of calling attention to this important piece of city infrastructure that is well run and produces great water. He also likes the idea of being proactive about protecting a valuable public resource and infrastructure.

Councilor O'Donnell presented an amendment that had been shared with the City Solicitor, Alan Seewald. Councilor O'Donnell indicated that the amendment had been recommended by the Solicitor.

Comments, Discussion & Debate:

The proposed changes don't modify the ordinance in any way, but rather clarifies that the public water resources and infrastructure of the City of Northampton shall be owned or leased by the City and controlled by the City and that such resources and infrastructure shall not be sold, leased or transferred into private ownership or control. The objective is that the City shall maintain total control over the entire water system infrastructure. The purpose of the ordinance in general is to make it unlawful to transfer control of the water infrastructure to private ownership. When asked whether there were leasing circumstances where the amendment applies, Councilor O'Donnell indicated that there is currently no existing example in which this amendment would apply. The amendment, however, looks to protect the City's interests in the future should it be necessary.

Councilor Adams noted that sometimes the City does lease to private companies or facilities, such as in the case of Ameresco leasing the former landfill station on Glendale Road. This ordinance would present an obstacle to the City if it does look to find a company to control the water infrastructure. Councilor O'Donnell noted that the intent was for the City to retain control over the water infrastructure, unless otherwise decided by voters.

Factors Considered:

The Committee reviewed the ordinance and heard testimony from Councilor Ryan O'Donnell. He, along with Mayor Narkewicz sponsored the ordinance. Councilor Sciarra read the proposed ordinance into the record. (Councilor Klein was absent from the discussion and did not vote on this ordinance).

Comments, Discussion & Debate:

This ordinance prevents the City Council, Mayor, or the city in general from privatizing the city's water infrastructure. This ordinance models an ordinance adopted by Gloucester, Massachusetts in 2010. Gloucester later took the step of putting the elements of the ordinance into their charter. The premise of the ordinance is that there are basic public resources that should not be privatized. Councilor O'Donnell noted locally, now is a good time to introduce such legislation since there is much talk about investments being made in the city's water and sewer infrastructure. Nationally, there is a lot in the news about water resources, including what is happening in Flint, Michigan. In the case of Flint, the water system has been poisoned by lead. While this is not attributable to privatization, it is attributable to emergency managers being appointed over the water infrastructure and comporting themselves as though they were a corporation and making decisions with no public input and taking drastic cost cutting measures that lead directly to the risk of public health. Northampton has outstanding water resources, and Councilor O'Donnell feels that steps should be taken to protect water going into the future.
