**A Resolution**

**Recognizing the Second Monday of October as Indigenous Peoples Day**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton recognizes that the Indigenous Peoples of the lands that would later become known as the Americas have occupied these lands since time immemorial; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton recognizes that Northampton is built upon the ancestral homelands and villages of the Indigenous Peoples of this region without whom the building of the City would not have been possible, to wit, from the Mohegan Tribe the Nipmucs and the Pequots, and from the Mohican Tribe, the Pocumtucs who established the Village of Norwottuck – or Nonotuck -- upon which much of present-day Northampton is situated; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton wishes to uplift the indigenous roots and history of, and contributions to, our city and this country;

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton is committed to respecting and protecting the full range of human rights as set forth in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and numerous other international human rights treaties; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton, in an effort to promote truth, healing, reconciliation, redress, and justice, acknowledges the ongoing trauma and historical harms, acts of genocide, and violations of the human rights of Native American, Alaskan Native, and other American Indigenous Peoples; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton has a responsibility to oppose the systemic racism towards Indigenous People in the United States which perpetuates their income, health, educational, and social inequality; and

**WHEREAS**, despite the fact that the federal government guaranteed the health, safety, and welfare of tribal nations in exchange for over 450 million acres of tribal land, American Indian and Alaska Native citizens experience higher disease rates, lower life expectancy rates, higher dropout rates, and higher poverty rates than any other racial or ethnic group in the country<sup>1</sup>; and

**WHEREAS**, the median income of American Indian and Alaska Native households is 70 percent of the median income of all U.S. households, and 28.4 percent of American Indians and Alaska Natives live in poverty compared to 15.3 Americans as a whole<sup>2</sup>; and

**WHEREAS**, American Indians and Alaska Natives have a life expectancy that is 4.2 years less than all other races in the United States and die at higher rates than other Americans from many diseases and harms including

chronic liver disease and cirrhosis, diabetes, assault and homicide, and intentional self-harm and suicide<sup>3</sup>; and

**WHEREAS**, data from the National Center for Education Statistics shows that on average, less than 50 percent of American Indian and Alaska Native students graduate from high school<sup>4</sup>; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Northampton understands that in order to help close the equity gap, government entities, organizations, and other public institutions should change their policies and practices to better reflect and significantly improve the experiences and outcomes of American Indian people; and

**WHEREAS**, the idea of Indigenous Peoples Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native nations to the United Nations-sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas<sup>5</sup>; and

**WHEREAS**, in 1990, representatives from 120 Indigenous nations at the First Continental Conference on 500 Years of Indian Resistance unanimously passed a resolution to transform Columbus Day into an occasion to strengthen the process of continental unity and struggle towards liberation, and thereby use the occasion to reveal a more accurate historical record<sup>6</sup>; and

**WHEREAS**, the United States federal government, the State of Massachusetts, and the City of Northampton recognize Columbus Day on the second Monday of October, in accordance with the federal holiday established in 1937;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the City Council of Northampton, Massachusetts

1. Hereby proclaims that the second Monday in October each year will be known as Indigenous Peoples Day; and
2. Celebrates and honors the foundational contributions of Indigenous People to the history of our City, the State of Massachusetts, and our country; and
3. Encourages the City's schools and other institutions to use Indigenous Peoples Day as a point from which to, throughout the year, reflect upon and learn about the historical abuses and continuing struggles of indigenous nations, and to celebrate the magnificent foundations of the indigenous people of this land upon which our city, state, and country were built; and
4. Encourages businesses and organizations in Northampton to recognize Indigenous Peoples Day; and
5. Shall continue to promote racial, economic, educational, health, and social equity and justice for all people and oppose discrimination towards Indigenous Peoples as it is perpetuated through inequities in income, health, and education.

Public Hearing Regarding Petition from National Grid to Relocate a Pole on Elm Street

A motion to open the public hearing was made by Councilor Murphy and seconded by Councilor Bidwell.

Lisa Jasinski from National Grid was present as a proponent to the petition. The plan is to relocate a pole on Elm Street. This is for the new entry that is going into College Lane at Smith College. The pole will be relocated 47 feet west of intersection of College Lane which moves the pole approximately 11 feet. Currently the pole is in the way of the planned new sidewalks.

Councilor Klein asked about an order on the agenda to discontinue a portion of Elm Street. Ms. Jasinski explained that the order is probably an agreement to eliminate a couple of parking spaces on Elm Street as part of the overall project. If that does not happen, the pole will not be moved. That agreement is between the City and Smith College and she is not aware of the status of that order. The petition before council is in preparation for the entire project. She believes that the pole will not be moved if the discontinuance does not happen.

There were no opponents to the petition.

Councilor O'Donnell announced that the City Council will hold two budget hearings where individual departments will present their budgets to City Council and speak to the upcoming needs for FY2017. The meetings are open to the public and will be held in the Police Department Community Room located at 29 Center Street. On May 25, 2015 the Fire Rescue Department and Central Services will present their budgets beginning at 5:30 p.m.

On Thursday, May 26, 2016, also beginning at 5:30 p.m., the Department of Public Works, Police Department, Forbes Library, Planning and Sustainability, Northampton Public Schools, and the Arts & Culture Department will present. Other departments may be invited to participate as well, however, no other departments are scheduled at this time. Councilor Klein noted that in 1990 the South Dakota legislature passed a state holiday called "Native American Day which is celebrated annually. In 1992, Berkley, California was the first to recognize Indigenous Peoples Day. Since then over twenty cities across the US have declared the second Monday of October Indigenous Peoples Day. Most recently Amherst passed a resolution that was written by Amherst Regional Middle School students to replace Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples Day. Councilor Klein believes that the Council owes it to the children, as well as to adults, of Northampton that it was and is this country's legal, moral and fiduciary responsibility to protect and ensure the wellbeing of native tribes. Throughout the last several centuries indigenous peoples have experienced governmental and societal neglect and racism, such as higher disease rates, lower life expectancy, etc. What is important is that the resolution instills the need to recognize the needs of indigenous people beyond the one day specified by resolution.

In addition to Councilor Klein, Councilor Carney thanked the teachers, students and community members for their thoughtful participation in the creation of this important legislation. As a former teacher, she knows the importance of getting this information in to the hands of teachers well in advance of the final stages of a curriculum development. Councilor Carney believes that this is a great opportunity to educate ourselves further about the Nonotuck people who inhabited this City of Northampton long before the Europeans who came here and settled.

Councilor Dwight noted that there is no Columbus Day celebration in Northampton. Indigenous Peoples day is an appropriate honor. He cautioned that a resolution cannot change a state holiday. He intends to support the initiative.

Councilor Bidwell moved to approve the resolution in 1<sup>st</sup> reading; Councilor Klein seconded the motion. The motion was approved on a roll call vote of 8 Yes, 0 No, 1 Vacant.

Councilor O'Donnell noted that the State Senate has acted upon legislation, but the entire legislature still has yet to weigh in on this important legislation addressing non-discrimination support. In 2012 the state of Massachusetts enacted provisions to protect against discrimination on the basis of gender identity for housing but left a "carve out" for public places. MA was the only state that passed for gender identity that had such an omission. The resolution is intended to address a civil rights loophole.

Councilor Dwight notes that the federal government has recently reacted to discriminatory law enacted by North Carolina.

**R-16.077**  
**A RESOLUTION**

**TO AFFIRM THE CITY'S NON-DISCRIMINATION POLICY AND IN SUPPORT OF EQUALITY OF ACCESS IN PUBLIC PLACES**

WHEREAS, The City of Northampton is guided by a fundamental and compelling interest to protect the civil rights of all its citizens and visitors, support public policies that prohibit unjust discrimination, and promote a society characterized by freedom and equality; and

WHEREAS, A free and equal society is one in which all people may access public places, including commercial space such as restaurants, hotels, and theaters as well as public space such as municipal buildings, parks and public transportation, among others, on equal terms; and

WHEREAS, In 2011 the Massachusetts legislature extended protections against discrimination on the basis of gender identity in matters of housing, employment, credit and education, but not in matters relative to public accommodations such as those described above; and

WHEREAS, Today, legislation currently before the legislature would close this gap in state law and extend such protections to all people to prohibit discrimination in matters of public accommodations on the basis of gender identity and guarantee equal access to public places regardless of gender identity;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Northampton, Massachusetts

1. Affirms that it is the policy of the City of Northampton that no person shall unjustly discriminate against any person belonging to a protected category, including age, ancestry or national origin, color, creed, family or marital status, gender identity, genetic information, mental or physical ability, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status or veteran status, relative to any essential public matter involving goods, services, or access that are generally available to all people, including education, employment, health care, housing, municipal services and public accommodations.

Chairman Dwight and City Councilors,

In January, 2016 the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) began reviewing project proposals submitted for CPA funding. After extensive review including applicant presentations, public comment sessions and committee deliberation the CPC unanimously voted to recommend eight funding requests totaling \$1,455,285. Collectively, these projects will leverage just over one and a half million dollars from other funding sources, including state and federal grants, private contributions, and volunteer work.

**Projects Recommended for Funding:**

**Stained Glass Window Restoration, First Churches of Northampton: \$213,000**

These funds will be used to restore two of the historic stained glass windows in the church sanctuary: The Tiffany window, which was gifted to the Church by the Parsons family in 1899, and the Rose window, which faces Main Street.

**Saw Mill Hills Open Space Acquisition, Northampton Conservation Commission: \$72,000**

This acquisition will add 22 acres to the Saw Mill Hills in Leeds: 3 acres on the western side of Reservoir Road with direct water access, and 19 acres of bluff and views overlooking the reservoir.

**Historic Scenic Curtain Restoration, Academy of Music: \$44,785**

This project will allow the Academy to restore a scenic curtain depicting a Northampton scene that was recently found stapled to the back of the main stage curtain. It is thought to be the largest remaining historic curtain on the East Coast.

**Supportive Housing for Homeless Youth, Friends of Hampshire County Homeless Individuals: \$275,000**

CPA funds will be used to contribute to the purchase price of a house in Northampton that will provide up to eight units of housing and support service for unaccompanied homeless youth. Homeless individuals between 18 and 25 face a gap in housing services that this home will help to address.

**Conservation Fund, Northampton Conservation Commission: \$30,000**

This fund creates opportunities for protection of open space and agricultural parcels in Northampton by allowing for fast action on time-sensitive real estate opportunities. The Fund creates an at-hand resource to conduct necessary due diligence work prior to acquisitions.

**Fitzgerald Lake Invasive Plant Control, Broad Brook Coalition \$12,800**

These funds will allow BBC to continue efforts to control and eliminate several different species of invasive plants that are damaging critical habitats essential to the health of native wildlife and plants, including endangered species.

**Shepherd Barn Dendrochronology Study, Historic Northampton: \$2,300**

CPA funds will be used to conduct a dendrochronology wood-dating study of the Shepherd Barn at historic Northampton, which will be used in preparation for a full restoration project of the structure.

**Pulaski Park Renovation and Expansion, Northampton Department of Public Works: \$805,400**

CPA funds will be used to continue design and construction of Pulaski Park. This phase includes construction of the Overlook Expansion that will create new park space to the rear of the existing park. The Committee recommends bonding for a portion of this project..

To the Honorable Members of the City Council,

Pursuant to my authority under Article 6, Section 6-1 of the City Charter, I am respectfully submitting the attached Administrative Order making the following three changes to the City's Administrative Code:

(1) Elimination of Public Works Commission as a Multiple-Member body.

My first proposed revision to the Administrative Code is the deletion of Part II, Section 20.0, "Public Works Commission." The Public Works Commission was created in my original September 2014 reorganization of city government as an advisory-only replacement for the Board of Public Works (BPW) whose considerable fiduciary and policy-making powers were shifted to the Department of Public Works (DPW) and Northampton's elected Mayor and City Council. My primary goal in creating the Public Works Commission at the time was to retain the dedicated members of the former BPW in an advisory capacity to the Mayor and City Council.

Defining the role of the new Public Works Commission has been challenging over the last 18 months. This is partially a result of the clearer, more direct line of executive branch reporting authority between the Mayor and the Department of Public Works under our restructured city government. It is also due to changes in our legislative branch, most notably the creation of a the City Council Committee on Public Works and Utilities whose role is to "develop, review, and recommend policies on matters including public works, streets, infrastructure, solid waste, water treatment, buildings, and all utilities including water, sewer and stormwater." With the professional leadership of the DPW and the city's two elected branches of government assuming these new, updated roles in the administration, policymaking, and oversight of public works, the need for a separate, stand-alone advisory body has now been substantially diminished.

The elimination of the Public Works Commission does not eliminate an ongoing and future role for citizen advisors on matters affecting public works. To the contrary, it is my intention to continue to utilize the talents and energy of citizens in advisory roles on public works-related issues whether on the Reuse Committee, Public Shade Tree Commission, Transportation and Parking Commission, Capital Improvements Committee, or in a myriad of other issue-specific advisory roles. The City Council's newly revised rules and restructured committee system provides a similar mechanism for involving citizen advisors through its select committee process.

Out of deference to the current members of the Public Works Commission, I provided a draft version of this Administrative Order to the members and attended their May 23, 2016 meeting to present and review it with them personally. We had a good discussion at which I reiterated my appreciation for their dedication to our public works and expressed my hope that they would continue serving the city in other capacities moving forward.

(2) Revised Authorities and Responsibilities language for the Public Shade Tree Commission

My second revision to the Administrative Code involves the Authorities and Responsibilities clause of Part II, Section 23.0, "Public Shade Tree Commission." City Councilors may recall public concerns being raised about the precise language of my original administrative order creating this new multi-member body back in 2014. I told the City Council at the time that once the Commission was appointed, organized, and operational they could review the language with the newly appointed Tree Warden and make any recommendations for updating or revising it. The updated Authorities and Responsibilities language submitted in the attached administrative order was developed by the Public Shade Tree Commission and Tree Warden this spring and recommended to me by a unanimous 7-0 vote. I support its adoption and incorporation in our code.

(3) Revised Procedure for Appointment of Elected Officials to Serve on Multiple-Member Bodies

During the development of the City Council's new Rules of Procedure at the end of the 2014-2015 term, a question arose regarding the method for appointing members of the City Council to multiple-member bodies with elected official membership. In order to negate a potential conflict between the council rules and the administrative code, I am adding language to Part II, Section 1.03, "Method of appointment; removal; term of office" that defers to the Council's preferred method of appointment by the City Council President.

Thank you in advance for your review of these proposed changes to our Administrative Code. I stand ready to answer any questions or provide additional information and respectfully request the City Council's approval of the attached Administrative Order.

Authorities and Responsibilities

The Public Shade Tree Commission preserves, protects and promotes city shade trees. The Commission advises and assists the Tree Warden and Mayor in researching and developing plans, programs and policies for achieving a tree canopy that supports Northampton's goals of public health, beautification, economic and environmental sustainability, and resilience in the face of climate change. The Commission reviews and makes recommendations on ordinance and zoning regulations related to trees. It receives and reviews input from city residents, businesses, and neighborhoods on issues or concerns related to trees, makes planting and maintenance recommendations guided by industry best practices, and works to promote knowledge and awareness of the benefits of an actively managed urban forest.

The Public Shade Tree Commission is an advisory multiple-member body of the City.

Amend City of Northampton Administrative Code,  
Part II Multiple-Member Appointive Organization, Section 1.03 as follows:

**DELETE IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACE WITH:**

**Method of appointment; removal; term of office.**

The Mayor appoints all members of multiple-member bodies, subject to confirmation by the City Council as provided in City Charter Section 2-10. Unless otherwise provided by law or administrative order, the terms of office of multiple-member bodies are arranged so that 1/3 of the terms, or as nearly that number as may be possible, shall expire each year; vacancies are filled in the same manner of appointment for the remainder of the term. In the case of multiple-member bodies with membership that includes elected officials, the Mayor shall seek appointment recommendations from the President or Chair of the elected body. Unless otherwise provided by law, the length of term shall be three years and appointments shall be effective on the first day of July and shall expire the last day of June. Members may be removed by the Mayor for such cause as the Mayor deems sufficient.
