Summary

A distinguished leader with proven success in program development, community organizing, advocacy, coalition building, intergenerational programming, and grant writing. Significant leadership experience in addressing human services issues and resource acquisition. Skilled in all aspects of supervisory and staff management. Ability to work effectively with private and public sectors and diverse populations. Has committed four decades of service to actively improving the lives of older people living in both Ireland and the United States.

Professional Accomplishments

- As the CEO of Care Local, a Dublin, Ireland based charity, I started a new initiative called the Plate Pals Programme, which was awarded the Vodafone World of Difference award. Through this volunteer based pilot, trained volunteers are assisting in nursing homes during meal time. Presently, according to research, more than 20% of the most vulnerable older people living in residential settings are malnourished. This new project addresses this critical issue.
- As Chairperson of the Docklands Senior Provider Council in partnership with other committee NGOs, older Docklands residents, the National College of Ireland, and major businesses, developed the first annual Docklands Book Sale. Twenty thousand books were collected, and all proceeds were distributed to older people's critical services in the Docklands area of Dublin. The book sale continues to generate €15,000 annually.
- As the Head of Empowerment and Regional Development for Age Action Ireland, I designed and developed the Getting Started Programme. Since its inception more than 4000 Irish older people have been trained in using computers and over 400 volunteers have been recruited and trained to assume a tutorial leadership role in Getting Started. It has been recognized as a program of E-inclusion Excellence by the Department of An Taoiseach (Irish Prime Minister) Information Society Policy Unit.
- Through the resources provided by an EU Interreg grant, I began a Positive Aging Cross Border Program. This project focused on three streams of service from a cross border perspective - Advocacy, Education, and Health/Social Activities. More than 1000 older people participated from both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.
- As Co-Chairperson of the National Advocacy Programme Alliance, in partnership with a number of older people's organizations and the Health Service Executive (HSE), I assisted in

the development of a National volunteer residential advocacy initiative, which was based on the US Ombudsman Program. Produced a video that won the EU Inter-generational Solidarity Award. As Vice President of Community Investment for United Way of Hampshire County, Massachusetts, established four new programs and brought an additional \$165,000 in revenue to the United Way of Hampshire County.

He submitted a letter to the City Council President outlining the section of the Charter he is asking the City Council to invoke, as well as other pertinent information. He will be leaving the country to visit Montenegro, which is where his wife's family is from. Because the Mayor is going to be a few time zones away, he thought it prudent to ask the City Council to invoke this particular section of the Charter now, rather than when an emergency arises while he is in transit. There may be some indispensable issue that cannot wait for the Mayor's return. The Charter specifies the powers of the Acting Mayor are just those powers that are indispensably essential to conduct the business of the City in an orderly and efficient manner in which action may not be delayed.</p> <p>Councilor Dwight noted that the only time this has been invoked was when former Mayor Higgins was away and there was a microburst on Pine Brook Curve in Florence. Then, Council President Bardsley was in charge of Emergency Management. Councilor Dwight points out that he would not be in charge of emergency management; that duty would fall to trained individuals. Mayor Narkewicz noted that Councilor Dwight would be responsible to declare an emergency, something which other emergency managers cannot sign.</p> <p>Mayor Narkewicz noted that the former Charter was a little ambivalent regarding this issue; the current Charter clarified this responsibility. He remembers that he was Acting Mayor during the "Great October Snowstorm". There are no City Council or School Committee meetings currently on the City Calendar, so there should not be any conflict for the Council President.</p> <p>Councilor Dwight noted that while he is Acting Mayor, he would be unable to vote on any issue before the City Council. This provision is spelled out in the Charter. Catholic Charities Presentation: Bringing Refugees into Northampton - Susannah Crollius

Susannah Crollius is the Coordinator for Outreach for Catholic Charities Office of Immigration, Migration and Refugee Services. Ms. Crollius also introduced Kathryn Buckley-Brawner who is the Executive Director of Catholic Charities. Ms. Crollius had a Powerpoint Presentation for the Council.

Ms. Crollius noted that there are 65 million people who are forcibly displaced from their homes; six months ago this number was 60 million. Of these, 15 – 17 million will officially be classified as "refugees". Only 1% (about 150,000) will be resettled to 28 countries around the world.

There is an international process as well as a regional process to determine how to address this situation. Locally, there are two agencies that resettle refugees, mostly in the Greater Springfield area. They are: Jewish Family Services and Ascentria Care Alliance. The largest refugee communities are from: Iraq, Somalia, Burundi, Congo, Bhutanese, Ukraine, Moldova, and now Syria.

Catholic Charities is the largest resettlement agency in the country. The agency in Springfield is a social services agency whose mission is to assist and empower vulnerable people to move them toward solid stabilization. The Springfield office as recently applied to become a resettlement agency, otherwise known as a "Reception and Placement" agency.

There are many reasons for becoming a Reception and Placement agency, including: the number of refugees coming to the US is increasing and the cap on the limit of refugees has been raised; the Catholic Council of Bishops asked if the agency would consider resettling refugees slated to come to the US; the greater Springfield area is already home to many thousands of refugees and Catholic Charities did not want to resettle refugees where resources are already stretched to capacity; the Northampton City Council passed a resolution welcoming refugees in December, 2015; the agency asked what it would look like to welcome refugees into a community that wanted them, embraced them, were creative thinkers and had the capacity and the resources to imagine with the agency a new way of resettling refugees so that the refugees and the community thrives.

The plan is to resettle 51 individuals within the Northampton community. This represents 10 – 17 families; the refugees would likely come from Syria, Afghanistan, Burundi, and/or Congo. The first families would not arrive until January, 2017; all 51 individuals would not arrive at once, but over a period of a year.

The initiative is described as community based and has an objective defined as follows: A seamless community-based infrastructure that supports and empowers newly arrived refugees, builds capacity in the period after 90 days, and sustains learning and integration through citizenship and beyond.

The current Federal program focus is on "self-sufficiency" (meaning: economic self sufficiency) and the goal is to get there in 90 days from arrival, or in some cases a maximum of 8 months. While this is a worthy goal, it is often unrealistic due to: emphasis on being employed right away, language learning, cultural learning, transportation, disorientation, trauma, isolation, and understaffed case workers who are unable to give adequate time and attention needed over the long haul.

Catholic Charities has met with two City Councilors, the Mayor and other Community Leaders. Faith Leaders have also been involved in the conversation. A "Welcome Home" steering group has been formed to develop a framework for how this would look and might work. From that Steering Group, there will be working groups that will be forming to tackle the practical issues involved in refugee resettlement. There are house parties forming that will be places of education. There will also be public conversations beginning in September. Working groups will be focusing on the issues of housing, the school system, and employment, volunteers/companions/circles of care, communications and public education.

The issues that will be addressed between now and January 2017 include: identifying 20 units of housing; identifying employers and apprenticeships; providing training for Circles of Care and Companion groups; making sure the school system has what it needs and feels confident in serving students; providing effective communication so that the Northampton community embraces and invests in new refugee neighbors.

The City Council is asked to join a working group and offer connections and expertise. They are also asked to get informed with the facts. The issue raises many concerns, and is a complex and multi-faceted issue. Councilors are asked to listen to people and to be prepared with the facts. If there are housing or employment opportunities, perhaps these could be made known.

Councilor Bidwell asked what type of housing tended to be most appropriate for a project like

this. Ms. Crolius responded that the agency is in the process of finding out the scope and the bounds of that. They are in conversation with migrant refugee services and the State Department about what constitutes appropriate housing.

Councilor LaBarge thanked Ms. Crolius for the presentation. She had received calls from residents on her ward about 51 coming to the City of Northampton and where homes will be found for them and the cost to educate them as well. Councilor LaBarge stated that she thinks it is extremely important that the residents living in the City are educated about exactly what Ms. Crolius is talking about tonight.

Councilor Dwight put this in context; the people who will be served by this project is a very small number. President Obama was willing to accept an additional 15,000 refugees (increased from 70,000 to 85,000, of which 10,000 will be Syrian refugees). Councilor Dwight notes that even 100,000 is a decent size town; 51 residents in a community of 29,000 is an easy transition. Some of the concerns that have been raised need to be addressed. The issues that have been raised have clear answers and Catholic Charities is well prepared to explain the process and the impact. Sometimes the question is, "why are we focusing on refugees when there are homeless already in our community?" These are not mutually exclusive endeavors. By and large the response has been accepting and enthusiastic. He is proud of Northampton for that reason. He is committed to working on this issue, and he believes there is a receptive community and government body in Northampton.

Ms. Crolius knows that there are challenges; however, Northampton was approached because this is the kind of community that can be creative and innovative with Catholic Charities.

Councilor LaBarge asked about the next meeting; Ms. Crolius commented that the next Steering Committee meeting has not been scheduled, but will be soon. Working groups will also be starting. Councilor Dwight noted that City Councilors need to be concerned about quorum issues. Not all of the meetings will be public because they are designed to prepare for public presentation. If there is a quorum of Councilors, the meeting would automatically need to become a public meeting. Councilor LaBarge asked why the meeting couldn't be posted as a joint City Council and Steering Committee meeting. Councilor Dwight stated that there may be a time for that, however, in the initial stages this may not be the best approach. If there is a quorum of a sub-committee or a quorum of the Council present at any meeting this will need to be negotiated among councilors to avoid any issues.

Councilor Klein noted that there will be opportunities for Councilors to be engaged because there are going to be a series of house parties that are in the works right now. It would be wonderful to have a councilor or two at each house party to show that City Council is supporting these efforts and also to listen to the concerns and questions that people have. There is a vision that there will be two mass community meetings in mid-September. Councilor Sciarra asked if the house parties were being organized by Ward; Councilor Klein noted that there are plans to organize house parties in various "quadrants" of the city. The planning is being looked at geographically, and in terms of social circles and colleagues. The idea is to get as broad spectrum of people as possible.

Kathryn Buckley-Brawner thanked the Council on behalf of Catholic Charities and the diocese of Springfield for the opportunity and for being so open and for already listening.

Going forward he would like to discuss the Council's role in fulfilling the role that the Public Works Commission did play in involving citizens in major decisions concerning public works. Other Councilors have had discussions about how this might happen through the Council's own committee that was established after changing the City Council rules last year. Public input and accountability is still an important part of the process when making major decisions or changes in the Public Works area.</p> <p>Councilor Bidwell noted that there was a good discussion in the most recent Committee on Public Works and Utilities. Former Ward 2 Councilor Paul D. Spector was present to provide perspective. Mayor Narkewicz was also present and the previous week, Councilor Bidwell had a conversation with the new DPW Director. It is noted that the City Council committee is the last committee where there will be the opportunity for public input regarding Public Works issues. The Committee does want to find a way for robust discussion involving the public. The DPW Director agrees that the new committee can become a forum for education and support building for the work of the department. The Committee also discussed the fact that there is a lot of expertise and institutional memory out there, especially on the part of former Public Works board members. Out of practicality, the former BPW met early in the morning when not a lot of the general public could participate. The new committee can provide a public forum, opportunity for education, and opportunities for public hearings relative to rate setting and other issues. Authorities and Responsibilities

The Public Shade Tree Commission preserves, protects and promotes city shade trees. The Commission advises and assists the Tree Warden and Mayor in researching and developing plans, programs and policies for achieving a tree canopy that supports Northampton's goals of public health, beautification, economic and environmental sustainability, and resilience in the face of climate change. The Commission reviews and makes recommendations on ordinance and zoning regulations related to trees. It receives and reviews input from city residents, businesses, and neighborhoods on issues or concerns related to trees, makes planting and maintenance recommendations guided by industry best practices, and works to promote knowledge and awareness of the benefits of an actively managed urban forest.

The Public Shade Tree Commission is an advisory multiple-member body of the City.

Amend City of Northampton Administrative Code,
Part II Multiple-Member Appointive Organization, Section 1.03 as follows:

DELETE IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACE WITH:

Method of appointment; removal; term of office.

The Mayor appoints all members of multiple-member bodies, subject to confirmation by the City Council as provided in City Charter Section 2-10. Unless otherwise provided by law or administrative order, the terms of office of multiple-member bodies are arranged so that 1/3 of the terms, or as nearly that number as may be possible, shall expire each year; vacancies are filled in the same manner of appointment for the remainder of the term. - Whereas, the city of Northampton supports the development of affordable housing; and
- Whereas, pursuant to Chapter 86 of the Acts of 1994, the state legislature authorized the conveyance of certain lots on Laurel Street and Burts Pit Road to the Northampton Housing Authority for the construction of affordable housing; and
- Whereas, Chapter 86 also authorized the conveyance of a certain parcel on Grove Street for use as an emergency homeless shelter
- Whereas, in 1999, the Commonwealth, acting through the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance, conveyed the Laurel Street and Burts Pit Road parcels to the Northampton Housing Authority, with a requirement that the parcels be used for affordable housing within five years of the conveyance or the parcels would revert to the Commonwealth; and
- Whereas, in 1998, the Commonwealth, acting through the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance, conveyed the Grove Street parcel to the City, which parcel is currently used as an emergency shelter known as the "Grove Street Inn" and operated under a lease by ServiceNet; and
- Whereas, the Northampton Housing Authority has not constructed affordable housing on

the Laurel Street and Burts Pit Road parcels; and

Whereas, in order to effectuate the construction of affordable housing on the Laurel Street and Burts Pit Road parcels, the City would like an amendment to Chapter 86 authorizing the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance to convey the Laurel Street and Burts Pit Road parcels to the City for reconveyance to a developer of affordable housing.

Whereas, the Mayor would like authorization to convey the Grove Street parcel to the operator of the emergency shelter with a provision for reversion to the City should the operator cease operating an emergency shelter

Whereas, special legislation is required in order to obtain the necessary amendments to Chapter 86, and in order for the state legislature to consider such special legislation a vote of the city council authorizing such legislation is required; and

Whereas, the Northampton Housing Authority supports the proposed amendments to Chapter 86, and on July 18, 2016, the board is expected to take a vote in support of the proposed legislation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED:

That the Mayor is authorized and directed to seek special legislation to amend the Acts of 1994, Chapter 86, in substantially the form set forth in the proposed legislation entitled An Act Relating to Land in Northampton, which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.

That the Mayor be authorized to make amendments to the proposed legislation attached hereto in his sole discretion in order to effectuate the purpose of this Order.
An Act relating to land in Northampton.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to forthwith authorize the transfer of certain parcels of land in the city of Northampton, therefore, it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 15 of chapter 86 of the acts of 1994 is hereby amended by striking out the first two paragraphs and inserting the following in place thereof:-
The commissioner of the division of capital asset management and maintenance is hereby authorized to convey by release deed to the city of Northampton, in the name and on behalf of the commonwealth, one or more parcels of land located in the city of Northampton, hereinafter referred to as "the parcels", for the purpose of providing affordable housing. The city of Northampton shall be authorized to convey any or all of the parcels to one or more non-profit entity or entities whose mission is the construction of affordable housing. Such conveyance shall comply with the provisions of section sixteen of chapter thirty B, the Uniform Procurement Act, and such other procurement laws that may be applicable.

In the event that any of the parcels conveyed to the city pursuant to this section are not used for the purposes described in this act on or before December 31, 2021, title to such parcel or parcels shall revert to the commonwealth upon notice by the commissioner of capital asset management and maintenance. If the city of Northampton conveys one or more of the parcels in accordance with the preceding paragraph and its grantee fails to use such parcel or parcels for the purposes set forth in this act within three years of the conveyance or ceases to use any of the parcels for such purposes, title to such parcel or parcels shall revert to the city of Northampton and may be reconveyed in accordance with this act.

SECTION 2. Said section 15 is hereby further amended by striking out the last

For further reference, see a plan entitled "89 WIBI Northampton Housing Authority" dated November sixteenth, nineteen hundred and eighty-nine and prepared by TWM Northeast E.J. Flynn Engineers, Inc. The precise configuration shall be described in a land survey to be prepared by the city of Northampton. The city of Northampton shall be responsible for costs and expenses including, but not limited to, costs associated with deed preparation and recording fees related to the conveyance of the parcel or parcels to the city as may be determined by the commissioner. The city of Northampton or its grantee or grantees shall assume the cost of appraisals, surveys and other expenses associated with the development of affordable housing as provided in the preceding paragraph.


In the event that the city of Northampton by majority vote of its city council, does not elect to purchase all of the parcels on or before December 31, 2017, or in the event that title to any of the parcels reverts to the commonwealth, then, notwithstanding sections 33 to 37, inclusive, of chapter 7C of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, the commissioner may sell, lease for terms up to 99 years, including all renewals and extensions, or otherwise grant, convey or transfer to purchasers or lessees an interest in said parcel or parcels on such terms and conditions that the commissioner considers appropriate. The commissioner shall dispose of said parcel or parcels using appropriate competitive bidding processes and procedures. At least 30 days before the date on which bids, proposals or other offers to purchase or lease a parcel or parcels are due, the commissioner shall place a notice in the central register published by the state secretary pursuant to section 20A of chapter 9 of the General Laws stating the availability of the property, the nature of the competitive bidding process and other information that the commissioner considers relevant, including the time, place and manner for the submission of bids and proposals and the opening of the bids or proposals.

SECTION 3. Said chapter 86 is hereby further amended by striking out section 16 and inserting the following in place thereof:-


SECTION 16. The commissioner of the division of capital asset management and maintenance is hereby authorized to convey by deed, to the city of Northampton a parcel of land located at 91 Grove street. Said parcel is to be used by the city or its assigns for the purpose of providing an emergency shelter for the homeless. Said parcel contains approximately one acre of land, the precise configuration of which may be determined in a survey. Conveyance of said parcel shall be without consideration and shall not be subject to the provisions of chapter seven of the General Laws. The commissioner shall establish the value of the property for both the highest and best use of the property as currently encumbered and for the purposes described in section 1. The commissioner shall place notification in the central register of the conveyance, the amount of such transaction and the difference between the calculated. The city of Northampton shall be responsible for costs and expenses including, but not limited to, costs associated with deed preparation and recording fees related to the conveyance of the parcel to the city as may be determined by the commissioner.

Upon the conveyance of said parcel to the city of Northampton, the city of Northampton is authorized to reconvey said parcel to a non-profit operator of such emergency shelter for the homeless provided that the deed shall contain a provision by which title to such parcel or parcels shall revert to the city of Northampton if its grantee ceases to operate an emergency shelter for the homeless. Upon reversion, the city of Northampton may reconvey such parcel to a non-profit operator of the emergency shelter for the homeless or for affordable housing for the homeless, the formerly homeless and/or for those at risk of homelessness in accordance with this act.



The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) – Highway Division proposes to reconstruct Damon Road in Northampton for a distance of approximately 1.1 miles. On behalf of MassDOT, Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) has prepared this letter to provide information about the project and solicit your input and comments. The project is currently in the 25% design submission phase of the MassDOT design process. The enclosed project information is provided for your reference and review.

The project consists of reconstructing Damon Road from the King Street (Route 5/Route 10) intersection to the south side of the Norwottuck Rail Trail signalized crossing. The project will abut MassDOT Project #604597, which proposes to construct a two-lane roundabout at the intersection of Route 9 and Damon Road/I-91 NB off-ramp.

The purpose of the project is to improve vehicular safety and capacity as well as pedestrian and bicycle accessibility throughout the corridor. The project entails reconstruction of the Damon Road and King Street (Route 5) intersection with new traffic signal equipment and full pedestrian accommodation. Additionally, bicycle lanes will be added to the roadways as well as a shared-use path for a portion of Damon Road to connect to the Norwottuck Rail Trail.

The improvements shall include pavement reconstruction to establish a consistent roadway cross section width, drainage system repairs, new sidewalks along both sides of the roadway, ADA compliant wheelchair ramps, a hot mix asphalt shared-use path along one side of the roadway, improved intersection geometry, traffic signal installation, and new pavement markings and signing throughout the corridor.

The project is scheduled to be funded through the 2018 Transportation Improvement Program for the Pioneer Valley Planning Organization.




Figure 1






