Charter Review Committee (CRC) Update

The Charter Review Committee (CRC) will hold a special meeting in the Jackson Street School gymnasium October 29, 2019 at 6:30 p.m., Councilor Dwight announced. Members will give an expanded summary of actions they have taken and recommendations they are preparing to make and hopefully have an opportunity to hear from people they haven't heard from so far. It is important to note that, although this is a mandated review, charter changes can be applied for at any time, he reminded. If significant changes come up, the legislature can be petitioned to amend the charter; i.e. - it is not a done deal if they are not included in the current petition.

As an example, Councilor Dwight referred to a request from two residents – Fred Zimnoch and Maria Tymoczko - for some type of annual report; i.e. - a summation of the year's report incorporating statistical analysis that is available on line but condensing it in book form for citizens who might not otherwise be able to access it through the internet. Residents asked them to put it in the charter but CRC members struggled to craft language to address the concerns expressed. "You can have transparency but it's more like invisibility if the public can't access it," he confirmed. Everyone agreed it was a laudable goal but they couldn't agree on how to do it, he elaborated.

One change that will be seen is the charter committee is recommending three-year contract periods for the audit. It was discussed making it part of the charter that the city should change auditors on three-year cycles but that was not included because it was recognized that this could result in the city having to accept inferior proposals if qualified applicants did not respond. A benefit of a three-year term is getting a more holistic perspective from the auditor and the auditor and city not having to suffer each other's learning curve, he suggested.

Councilor Nash updated the council on the progress of the Select Committee on Pesticide Reduction (SCPR). Members are working on a very tight schedule since they are due to submit a report by November 10th, he reminded. The group has met four times. The first few meetings dealt with organizational matters such as electing officers, reviewing the Open Meeting Law, etc. They have been working with the Mayor's office and heard from various departments the last two meetings. A lot of interesting things are happening with pesticide use, so there is a lot of good news to report.

Members are meeting Monday at 10 a.m. and will be going over the scope of their report. They will also hold two public forums: Wednesday, October 16, 2019 from 7 to 9 p.m. in the City Hall

The meetings are being posted as joint meetings with the City Council so all are welcome to attend.</p> <p>Mayor Narkewicz clarified that, although state law requires towns to produce an annual report, cities do not have a similar legal obligation.</p> <p>Councilor Nash publicly recognized city officials who participated in international 'Walk to School' Day October 2nd. To celebrate, a number of individuals met at the Lumberyard and accompanied the walking school bus to Bridge Street School, where the PTO had snacks and breakfast bars waiting. Councilor Sciarra, Mayor Narkewicz, Senator Comerford and district aide Sam Hopper met them at the school. There are now two walking school bus routes at Bridge Street School and the school is still looking for more 'drivers.' He encouraged anyone interested to go to the school's website and look for the walking school bus page.</p> <p>And, Monday, October 7, 2019 at 7 p.m., he and Andrew Crystal of O'Connell Development are sponsoring an informational forum related to the development project for St. John Cantius Church. WHEREAS, Massachusetts authorizes municipalities to “aggregate the electric load of interested electric consumers within its boundaries” to provide competitive electric supplies (MGL Chapter 164 Section 134), commonly known as **Community Choice Aggregation (CCA)**;

WHEREAS, Over 145 Massachusetts municipalities have adopted some form of CCA;

WHEREAS, On October 12, 2012, City Council authorized the city to participate in a CCA through the former Hampshire Council of Governments to allow a greening of the city’s electric supply and encourage energy conservation and renewable energy;

WHEREAS, The City, in cooperation with Amherst and Pelham, the University of Massachusetts Clean Energy Extension, the Urban Sustainability Directors Network (USDN), and six other municipalities around Massachusetts and the United States, has been studying how a CCA can provide competitive electric supplies while prioritizing a reduction in greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions;

WHEREAS, The City, through its Planning & Sustainability and in cooperation with Central Services and outside partners, obtained a grant from USDN to hire outside consultants to study the most effective ways that a CCA can reduce greenhouse gas emissions (“CCA 3.0”);

WHEREAS, The draft *Northampton Climate Resiliency and Regeneration Plan* identifies CCA as a critical strategy (a high impact practice) to reduce greenhouse gas emissions;

WHEREAS, Any Northampton CCA would have dual priorities of procurement of maintaining competitive electric rates and maximizing greenhouse gas emission reductions.
