Re: 2 Pole Petitions for Joint National Grid/Verizon New Pole Locations No. 25763215

National Grid is proposing to install 4 new poles (61, 62, 63 and 71), and to relocate a pole (64) on Park Hill Rd between Glendale Road and the new Solar Field, as identified on 2 pole petitions with the above referenced number.

There are no conflicts with public utilities at the proposed locations. There appear to be conflicts with public shade trees in several of the proposed locations. Removal or pruning of public shade trees is subject to the requirements of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 87 and is under the jurisdiction of the City of Northampton's Tree Warden.

DPW approves these petitions, with the following conditions:

- A submittal should be made to the Department of Public Works (DPW), attn. Tree Warden, requesting removal and/or pruning of trees affected by the work included in these petitions.
- A valid trench permit approved by the DPW must be in place before work commences, and will not be issued until shade tree conflicts have been resolved.





Fiscal Year 2021 Budget Message

To the Honorable Members of the City Council,

I submit for your consideration and approval my proposed \$116,988,993 fiscal year 2021 budget for the City of Northampton in accordance with Article 7, Section 7-3 of our Charter.

The budget is comprised of a \$101,074,681 General Fund budget together with four Enterprise Fund budgets for Water (\$6,945,000), Sewer (\$6,177,500), Solid Waste (\$795,326), and Stormwater and Flood Control (\$1,996,486). This budget proposal represents a 0.03% decrease from the current fiscal year 2020 City of Northampton budget expiring on June 30, 2020.

This is not the budget I had envisioned drafting on the evening of Tuesday, March 3, 2020, after Northampton voters overwhelmingly approved a \$2.5 million Proposition 2 ½ general override renewing our multi-year fiscal stability plan. Just one week later on Tuesday, March 10, 2020, Governor Charlie Baker declared a state of emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Our schools and non-essential government buildings were soon closed, the closure of non-essential businesses would soon follow, and our city and state economies were put into what some have described as a “medically induced coma” in an effort to stem the spread of the deadly coronavirus.

With the exception of those businesses and industries deemed essential by the Governor, most of the small, locally owned retailers in our downtown districts have been closed for weeks. Many Northampton residents have been furloughed or laid off from jobs, and unemployment nationwide has reached levels not seen since the Great Depression. The pandemic has plunged our economy into a recession that may take years to recover from.

Municipal government has not been spared from the economic impacts of COVID-19. The City of Northampton’s major sources of local revenue like parking, building permits, taxes on hotel/motel, meals, and adult-use cannabis have dropped significantly. We are

projecting a shortfall of up to \$1.85 million in the fourth quarter of fiscal year 2020 and potentially over \$2 million in the first quarter of fiscal year 2021 alone. The city is also experiencing significant unbudgeted expenses as our public health, public safety, and other city departments respond and adapt to the COVID-19 pandemic both now and for the foreseeable future.

The severe economic stress facing Northampton residents and businesses led me to delay implementation of the voter-authorized Proposition 2 ½ property tax increase scheduled to go into effect in six weeks and forgo utilizing any of the \$2.5 million in additional tax levy capacity until fiscal year 2022 beginning July 1, 2021. While I feel strongly that we cannot in good conscience implement the tax increase during a combined public health and economic crisis, this decision will put additional stress on an already dire revenue picture.

As I submit this message, we have no updated information on the still pending fiscal year 2021 Massachusetts state budget which in fiscal year 2020 provided 16.63% of the revenue used to fund the city's budget. In a normal year, both the Governor and House would have completed their respective versions of the budget by now and the Senate would have begun working on its version. With no clear timetable for if and when a state budget will be enacted, we are building our city budget with very conservative state aid estimates knowing that we may need to revisit them later in the fiscal year.

It is in this context of extreme economic disruption and financial uncertainty that I am proposing a city budget representing an overall decrease from the current fiscal year and only a slight increase to the General Fund of less than one half of one percent. Given the high likelihood that additional budget cuts may be needed in fiscal year 2021 and future budget years, it is only fiscally prudent and responsible to trim our sails now rather than deferring what would only be deeper and more severe cuts moving forward. This has required difficult fiscal and personnel decisions.

My proposed budget for fiscal year 2021 eliminates 17.25 full-time equivalent positions across a number of city departments including Building, Human Resources, Information Technology Services, Public Works, Parking Enforcement, Senior Services, and Treasurer/Collector. I must lead by example as Mayor, so my own office will shoulder some of these difficult reductions through the elimination of one staff position.

Some of these staff reductions have already occurred through layoffs in the current fiscal year to address our fiscal year 2020 revenue shortfalls. Other reductions involve the elimination of positions left vacant by promotions, transfers, or retirement and, together with any needed reallocation of duties, will net us a projected \$613,952 in expenditure reductions to balance our budget.

We have shielded the Health Department and our frontline public safety departments of Police, Fire Rescue, and Emergency Dispatch from any staffing reductions as they are critical to the city's ongoing response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

We have also worked to hold our public schools harmless from any program or personnel cuts. The education and social and emotional well-being of our city's children have been severely impacted by the COVID-19 shutdown and we know this will require its own recovery process. While not providing the same level of appropriation increases

we had projected in conjunction with passage of an override, both of our public school districts will receive substantial appropriation increases to support their critical educational missions. The two largest expenditure increases in this proposed fiscal year 2021 budget will go to the Northampton Public Schools (\$1,118,095) and Smith Vocational and Agricultural High School (\$646,747).

The next two largest expenditure increases are among the city's many fixed costs that by definition cannot be deferred or significantly reduced despite our financial circumstances. Employee health insurance and the city's required contribution to the Northampton Retirement System will rise \$443,632 (3.98%) and \$258,205 (4.1%) respectively in fiscal year 2021.

While we are delaying implementation of the March 2020 override and suspending the renewal of the multi-year fiscal stability plan until fiscal year 2022, we will utilize \$935,020 from the Fiscal Stability Stabilization Fund to balance this budget. This will leave a balance of just over \$2 million in that fund which was created with the 2013 override. Combined with our three other stabilization funds we will enter the new fiscal year with over \$13 million in total reserves to help us weather the economic and budgetary uncertainty that surely lies ahead.

During the many override town halls I held around the city in the months prior to the COVID-19 emergency, I spent considerable time explaining - and sometimes defending - my determined commitment to rebuilding Northampton's reserve funds that had been severely depleted following the 2008-2009 "Great Recession." I am thankful to the City Council for supporting a steady and disciplined approach to replenishing reserves over the last eight years. Our city's strong reserve position will play a critical role in our ability to successfully navigate the uncharted economic and budgetary waters ahead.

This proposed fiscal year 2021 budget is the ninth budget I have submitted to City Council since being elected Mayor of Northampton. It has easily been the most challenging to compose both logistically - during a state of emergency with city offices being closed and all work done remotely - and because of the difficult fiscal decisions that could not be responsibly avoided or delayed given the very real potential for sustained revenue loss and additional cuts moving forward.

I am extremely proud of our city's response to the COVID-19 emergency. City employees have rapidly adapted to maintaining core governmental functions remotely while delivering services and vital information. School administrators, teachers, and support staff have worked to continue educating, feeding, and supporting the well-being of our schoolchildren. Public safety departments have worked to keep our community safe and been on the front lines of responding to COVID-19 medical emergencies. Our public health team has led a city and regional response to the pandemic, working to track and contain the virus and issuing critical health guidance and orders to prevent its spread and protect our most vulnerable. Despite the significant fiscal challenges we face in the days and months ahead, your municipal government has and will continue to focus on serving and protecting its residents during this unprecedented public health crisis.

I want to thank our Finance Director Susan Wright for her incredible work on this budget under challenging circumstances. Between the override and our current crisis, she has

had to develop not one but multiple budgets over the last several months and has done so with her usual calm and clear-headed wisdom. Thank you to our city department heads and school superintendents for working with us to make difficult choices to develop this fiscally constrained budget. Thank you as well to the other members of my office staff, Alan Wolf, Annie Lesko, and Court Cline for their assistance compiling and finalizing this document with professionalism and remote teamwork.

I look forward to working with the City Council over the next several weeks to answer any questions about this budget or provide additional information it may need.

O-20.062 AN ORDER TEMPORARILY SUSPENDING THE EFFECT OF CERTAIN ORDINANCES IN RESPONSE TO EFFORTS TO REOPEN RESTAURANTS IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF COVID SAFE SOCIAL DISTANCING

WHEREAS, a sudden, generally unexpected occurrence of circumstances demanding public action has arisen worldwide, including in the city of Northampton, due to the Coronavirus/Covid-19 pandemic (“the pandemic”); and

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts declared a State of Emergency in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts due to the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, the Mayor of the City of Northampton declared a State of Emergency in the City of Northampton due to the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2020, the Northampton Board of Health declared a State of Emergency in the City of Northampton due to the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 2020, Governor Baker issued an Order prohibiting on-premises consumption of food or drink; and

WHEREAS, on June 1, 2020, the Governor issued his four-phase plan for Reopening Massachusetts, which includes outdoor restaurant table service in Phase II; and

WHEREAS, in order to facilitate the reopening of restaurants with outdoor-only table service, restaurants in certain zones of the city, as depicted on the plan entitled “Covid-19 Restaurant Response Zones,” may need to include contiguous and non-contiguous outdoor areas, including some within public ways and some on other property of the city; and

WHEREAS, Phase II of Reopening Massachusetts is tentatively scheduled to commence on June 8, 2020; and


WHEREAS, the city council finds that encouraging, promoting and facilitating the reopening of restaurants in the Covid-19 Restaurant Response Zones by temporarily allowing certain activities to take place within public ways and on other public property that would not otherwise be allowed absent the state of emergency, in order to allow orderly opening of restaurants consistent with the requirements of the Governor’s Phase II Order, is in the public interest.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Northampton City Council orders as follows:

1. Notwithstanding any Order of the city council to the contrary, within the areas depicted on the plan entitled "Covid-19 Restaurant Response Zones" ("the zones"), the City Council hereby authorizes the change of use of any property within the public way or on other city property ("city property") to outdoor restaurant table service seating ("the outdoor table service areas").
2. The Mayor shall, in his discretion, designate the locations of outdoor table service areas, may enter into such licenses, easements, agreements and other instruments as he deems necessary, may designate rules and regulations for the use of the outdoor table service areas, and may take such other action as he deems necessary to effectuate this Order.
3. With regard to the outdoor table service areas and ancillary areas within the adjacent zones, § 120-1; § 285-5; § 285-8; § 285-11; § 285-29 and c. 303, are hereby suspended to the extent necessary, in the Mayor's discretion, in order to effectuate the intent of this Order:
4. Notwithstanding the Schedules set forth in Article XII, parking spaces in the zones may be re-designated as outdoor table service areas, in the Mayor's discretion, and the Mayor may designate other areas within the public way as parking in lieu of spaces re-designated as outdoor table service areas.
5. Notwithstanding the foregoing enumeration of ordinances, the intent of this Order is to suspend temporarily, to the extent necessary, those ordinances that would inhibit, interfere with, or prohibit the conversion of city property within the zones to outdoor table service areas.
6. This Order shall lapse on November 15, 2020 or upon the lifting of the Governor's declared state of emergency, whichever occurs sooner, without further action by the city council. Thereupon, all ordinances suspended in whole or in part hereunder shall revert to their full force and effect immediately preceding this Order.

20.064 A RESOLUTION
IN RESPONSE TO THE MOST RECENT KILLINGS OF AFRICAN-AMERICANS

Whereas:

George Floyd, an unarmed African-American man, was asphyxiated by a Minneapolis police officer or officers on May 25th 2020; and

Whereas:

Breonna Taylor, an African-American Emergency Room Technician, was shot eight times and killed in her own home by Louisville police on March 13th, 2020; and

Whereas:

Ahmaud Arbery, an African-American man was shot and killed by two white civilian men while jogging through a South Georgia neighborhood on February 23rd, 2020; and

Whereas:

Mr. Floyd's, Ms. Taylor's, and Mr. Arbery's deaths and the manner of their deaths are yet more examples, in a list of countless examples, of an endemic culture of oppression and racism that exists in our country; and

Whereas:

The widespread revulsion demonstrated by our fellow citizens to this, and to all of the accumulated historical racist actions, requires a reckoning and a commitment from all of us to confront this greatest threat to our society; and

Whereas:

In the absence of presidential leadership, it is incumbent upon local authorities to respond to the suffering that racism inflicts; and

Whereas:

Silence and lack of expressed outrage and sorrow reflect complacency and, by extension, complicity in these atrocities; and

Whereas:

We continue to mourn the most recent deaths chronicled in this resolution and all of the racially perpetrated deaths that preceded them; and

Whereas:

The City Council of Northampton has for decades decried and condemned by resolution and laws the myriad racist acts committed by individuals and persons in authority; and

Whereas:

The City Council of Northampton will continue to stand unified in our commitment to confront institutional racism, implicit bias, and bigotry in all forms and violence.

Now therefore be it resolved that the City Council of Northampton:

Reasserts its unequivocal opposition to expressions and acts of hate; and

Be it further resolved that:

We call for increased resources from the Commonwealth for comprehensive anti-racism trainings for state and municipal employees and students; and

We will devote our efforts to expanding the challenging but necessary community conversation on racism and on all of our respective culpabilities; and
